Henry Cathles, in a letter in your March 2 issue, declares that "stockholders in general have little influence and get less attention than any other groups in the United States."

It doesn't have to be this way. Our company, Analog Devices, Inc., has recently taken some steps to give stockholders increased attention. For a start, we have scheduled a series of open regional meetings with them. The first was held in New York City on March 21.

We also undertook a major survey by telephone and mail to get stockholder feedback on a variety of topics. One preliminary finding: Stockholders prefer us to keep right on investing earnings, sustaining our growth goals, instead of paying cash dividends.

On the other hand, the survey revealed a strong current of stockholder opinion favoring stock dividends. So on March 11 our board of directors demonstrated that stockholders can indeed have strong influence in company affairs—it voted for a 5 per cent stock dividend.
